### A PASTOR'S PONDERING

We have a beautiful maple tree in our front yard. Its leaves have turned a magnificent shade of red in the past couple weeks. With recent winds, they have seriously begun to drop onto the grass. Fall is here. As I drive in to the office, I pass through lots of farm land. The corn and soybeans are brown, the combines are out, and the semi trucks are on the roads. Harvest is here. The earth is giving up its bounty.

Halloween is here — All Hallow's Eve — and then the festival of All Saints. Halloween comes to us from the Celtic festival of Samhain, when the veil between this world and the Otherworld was lifted, and the spirits of those deceased were allowed to walk the earth and finish old business. When Christianity came to the Celtic lands, it established the festival of All Saints as a time for us to finish old business with loved ones who have passed to life in the spirit. Samhain marked the end of the Celtic year, just as All Saints is the last festival of the Christian year. Advent will be here in a month's time, bringing with it a new church year.

Crunching through leaves and driving through clouds of dust from the harvesters, I often think about this time. It is a time to "let go." It is time for the trees to let go of their leaves. It is time for the corn stalks to let go of their corn. All for the purpose of making room for new growth. It is time for us to let go of things that no longer serve us, to make room for new growth in our own being.

It is time for us to "clean house," to finish old business, to reap the harvest of what our lives have planted this past year. It is time for us to take stock of ourselves — time to gather in those good things and discard the detritus. By doing that, we make room for the new life of a new year. We make room for the Christ Child to enter into our lives.

This time of gathering in and letting go is a bittersweet time for many. We can see the fruits of our labor and celebrate our bounty, but yet there's an emptiness, too. It's often difficult to let go of things we don't need. We like the color on the trees, but not so much on our lawns. We like to see the harvest, but the fallow fields seem stark. Merchants rush to fill this void with Christmas. We rush to fill this void with parties and gatherings, with football and fall festivals. Because we just don't like that empty feeling.

The early church Mothers and Fathers had a Greek term for this spiritually-empty experience. They called it *apophatic*. It means "negative." It's a spirituality that embraces the empty times and the lack of language we have to describe God. It embraces those times and events where our spirits sort of lie fallow, like the earth. This negativity, though, is a positive thing. It creates space for us to take a closer look at ourselves. It creates space for us to sort through our lives. It creates space for us to recharge our spiritual batteries, not through study and words, but through contemplation, perhaps without words. It creates space for us to really open our eyes to the wonders of the world and of life, and to see what God maybe has in store for us as we go forward. And it creates space for us to mourn our losses — to take care of old business so that, as we embrace a new year, we can also embrace newness of life.

I encourage us to step into that emptiness — to embrace it — to use it as a time to take a breather. Enjoy the festivities, but also enjoy the leanness of this time.

May it be so! May it be so for us!

The Church Board will meet on Sunday, November 6th immediately following worship.




