A PASTOR'S PONDERING

On the Day of Pentecost (that is, fifty days after Jesus' Resurrection), the disciples were all gathered, and suddenly there was a rush of a mighty wind. The Holy Spirit descended on them as tongues of fire, and they began to speak in different languages, as the Spirit gave them utterance. And the gathered crowd, representing several nations and languages, each understood what the disciples were saying *in their own languages*. It was the great mystery that gave birth to the Church.

Holy Spirit. It's a strange concept. It's Biblical, yet we don't really know much about it. Since about the year 800, the Church has even debated where it comes from. Does it come from the Father alone, or does it come from the Father and the Son? The Eastern Church declares that it comes from the Father. The Roman Church declares that it comes from the Father and the Son. Consequently, that's what we Protestants mainly believe too. What is the Holy Spirit? Why is it important for us? We don't worship it. We don't pray to it. Does it even have a particular purpose? The Father <u>creates</u>. The Son <u>redeems</u>. What does the Holy Spirit do for us?

I'd like to shift gears a bit and explore the Hebrew and Greek words we translate as "spirit." The Hebrew word is *ruach*. It means "spirit." It also means "breath." So when God blew into Adam's nostrils and Adam became a living being, God was not only blowing air, God was also blowing *spirit* into Adam. The Greek word we read in the New Testament is *pneuma*. Guess what? It <u>also</u> means both "breath" and "spirit" (or "soul").

If we were to re-translate those words as "breath," instead of "spirit," we would end up with "the Holy Breath," instead of "the Holy Spirit." Let's work with that understanding for a moment. If we understand the Holy Spirit as <u>breath</u>, it begins to make more sense to us. So, what is the Holy Breath? Why is it important for us? What is it's purpose?

We often hear that the Holy Spirit <u>sustains</u> us. That's it's purpose. The Holy Breath sustains us. Isn't that true? Our breath — that intake of oxygen and output of carbon dioxide <u>does</u> sustain us, doesn't it? If we don't breathe, we die. Our breath (theologically speaking) is the physical manifestation of our <u>spirit</u>, and, really, of <u>God's</u> Spirit moving in us. When we breathe, our lungs expand and contract, our diaphragm moves, our abdomen rises and falls. Our breathing makes us, as Genesis says, "living beings."

We also understand that the Holy Spirit <u>comforts</u> us. Jesus said that he would send "the Comforter" to be with us after he was gone. The Holy Breath comforts us. And isn't <u>that</u> true, as well? When we're startled, we experience a sharp intake of breath. When we're anxious, we sigh. Buddhist monks have a practice of meditative breathing. We've found that a deep intake of breath, followed by a very slow, measured exhale over several seconds, repeated five or so times, will calm us and help to alleviate anxiety. When we practice this "centered breathing," we become grounded in our bodies. If our breath (theologically speaking) is the physical manifestation of <u>spirit</u> — of <u>God's</u> Spirit, moving in us, then Holy Breath really is a comfort for us.

What if we stopped scratching our heads over the nature and definition of the Holy Spirit and began a practice of just embracing Holy Breath? What if we came to understand that God is as close to us — and within us — as our breathing? What if every breath we took was seen as embracing God? What if we understood that <u>everyone</u> breathes the same air as we do? What if we understood that <u>everyone</u> — no matter what religion they practice, no matter by what name they know God, no matter if they don't even *believe* in God at all — breathes the same Divine Spirit, and really is as close to the Divine as we are? Would it change how we see and treat others? Would it change how we perceived our relationship with God?

Every time we take a breath, we experience newness of life. Every time we take a breath, we experience Pentecost. Every time we take a breath and exhale, we put God out there in the world. God is Breath. God is shared. Life is reborn.

May it be so! May it be so for us!
