## A PASTOR'S PONDERING

It's November. For the past couple weeks, Lisa and I have begun to see Christmas commercials on TV. When we went to Hobby Lobby last weekend to pick up some fall decorations for the house, we found that Christmas had almost taken over the store! The other day, I heard someone refer to Thanksgiving as "a bump on the holiday highway." While many of us are beginning to think of Christmas - purchasing gifts and planning ahead for travel, celebrations, and vacations, and while many of us are excited for the season, I think it's sad that Thanksgiving has been relegated to being a "bump in the road" and one more opportunity to watch football.

Thanksgiving is a national holiday. But it's also a spiritual observance. President Washington was the first president to issue a proclamation in 1789, designating Thursday, November 26 as a day "for the People of the United States as a day of public thanksgiving." Then, during the Civil War, President Lincoln proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day, to also be celebrated on November 26. Finally, President Franklin Roosevelt signed a congressional bill making the fourth Thursday of November officially Thanksgiving Day in the United States.

It seems that, in times of crisis, beginning with the supply shortage in 1621 , through a devastating Civil War, and through an equally devastating Depression, our civic leaders have always stressed the importance of giving gratitude. Our spiritual leaders also know the importance of standing in gratitude. Paul teaches us to "give thanks in all circumstances." That's why Holy Communion is known in the Greek of the Bible as eucharist, or "meal of thanksgiving." The importance of giving gratitude cannot be stressed enough.

Thanksgiving is a time specially set aside for us to foster and practice gratitude. It's a designated time for us to remember and give thanks for our blessings. But it's also more than just a day, and it's more than just sitting back in our comfort and making a laundry list - sometimes a fairly smug laundry list. Gratitude isn't separate from our daily living. It's not a holiday from the ordinary; it's a "holy day" that marks the importance of the gratitude in our daily life that makes every day extraordinary. Thanksgiving isn't something we "observe." It's about a choice. Thanksgiving is a choice we make to have a particular attitude toward the world and a particular outlook on life.

What that means is that Thanksgiving is most definitely not "a bump on the holiday highway." I'd say it's, at the least, an indispensable precursor to Advent and Christmas. But it's not just "all about Christmas." Thanksgiving stands on its own as a time for us to make ceremony out of gratitude. "Making ceremony" is how we state an intention. It's how we make something communally important. Our civic leaders knew that. Our spiritual leaders knew it. And we know it too. One thing we know in our national life is abundance. And we don't want to take that abundance for granted, especially because there are still many large pockets of poverty here. So we "make ceremony" out of a sense of righteousness - that is, we solemnize the paying forward of our blessings to those who are in need. That's part of what it means to "live in gratitude." And living in gratitude is strong medicine for us - emotionally, spiritually, and physically, too! Gracious people are generally happy people. And gracious people are gracefilled people. And grace-filled people are people who live all life abundantly, as Jesus intends for us to do.

## May it be so! May it be so for us!
