More in the Life and Witness of the First Christian Church

A PASTOR'S PONDERING

This past Lent, we were involved in a worship series entitled, *Listen: Hearing that Still, Small Voice and Finding Your Own*. We encountered blocks of silence that were, at the same time, both welcome and unsettling. We learned that prayer isn't all about giving God a laundry list of wants, needs, and wishes. We discovered that prayer is holy *conversation* — that it's about <u>listening</u> as much as it is about <u>telling</u>. We saw that prayer is about fostering *relationship* — both with God and with ourselves. What we found, in the end, is that *prayer is important to a fulfilling life*.

We are now in what's called "the Easter season." It's a time for resurrection. It's a time for new beginnings. It's a time for us to affirm the abundance of life we're created to have. As we work our way through Easter and approach Pentecost — that time when we celebrate the coming of Holy Spirit — I'd like for us to build on that theme of <u>prayer</u>. We've touched on *listening* in prayer (and, believe me, there's a <u>whole</u> lot more we could do in the arena of listening in prayer!) But there are other components of prayer we should familiarize ourselves with. There are components of speaking, and <u>acting</u>, and <u>living into</u>. There are especially components of <u>being</u> that we need to explore and discover.

A church is more than just a building — more than just a <u>place</u> where we encounter the holy. A church is more than just the promulgation of the Gospel. A church is more than just good works. Above everything else, a church is a *community*. It's where people gather together to become, *together*, more than they are alone. It's where people develop and live into right relationship with each other. And at the peak of that <u>relational</u> aspect is something that sets the church apart from every other effort, from every other group, from every other club, from every other doer of good works, and from every other kind of relationship. You see, other groups and clubs and organizations can foster relationship and build community. Other organizations can help people in need. But the church is the only organism that becomes and identifies as "the body of Christ." We are the only organism that lives and works as God's corporeal representatives in the world. And, as the body of Christ, the church needs and thrives upon <u>prayer</u>. We *feed* on prayer. Prayer <u>nourishes</u> us.

I believe the church needs to be <u>centered</u> in prayer, and we, both individually and as a community, should live out our lives — and our common life — in prayer. This next year, I'd like for us to learn as much about prayer and the spiritual life as we can. I'd like for us to learn to engage in all different kinds of prayer. I'd like for us, not only to become *adept* at prayer, but <u>hungry</u> for prayer. I'd like for us, as a community, to emphasize prayer in our life together this year.

Toward that end, I offer several ideas I'd like to see happen. First, I'd like for us to establish a "prayer wall." Much as our Jewish sisters and brothers go to "The Wailing Wall" and stick little bits of paper in the cracks between the stones that have prayers written on them, I'd like for us to have a similar opportunity to write out our petitions and place them. It ties a spiritual motivation to a physical action.

Second, I'd like for us to continue the practice we began during Lent of lighting candles for our prayer intentions. It brings light to our intentions.

Third, I'd like for us to organize a group who will commit to pray daily for the needs we place on our prayer wall. It will become the "heartbeat" of our faith community.

Fourth, I'd like for us to organize a contemplative prayer circle that will meet monthly, for those who are interested to learn the practice of meditation and contemplative prayer.

Fifth, I'd like to form a class for adults — perhaps a Sunday morning "adult forum" whose purpose is learn more about how to make prayer a daily, integrative practice for any follower of Jesus. We'd do a book study for that forum.

Sixth, I'd like for our chapel space to truly become a specially set-apart prayer space. Let's move our meetings and classes to another space.

I believe a praying church is a *growing* church. As we pray, we grow closer to God. As we grow closer to God, we become more Christlike. As we become more Christlike, our ministries will flourish. As our ministries flourish, we become more healthy and we live more deeply. I hope you'll join me as we discover a richer prayer life together.
